OUR FUTURE LOOKS BRIGHT

This past year set the stage for many new and innovative beginnings. We held our first statewide diaper drive, began advocating for Medicaid coverage for infant and toddler diapers, and expanded regionally. And that's not all! We launched a partnership with the Connecticut Hospital Association called Diaper Connections, and laid the groundwork to create a revenue stream to help support our future work.

The Diaper Bank of Connecticut believes every person deserves to live safe, secure, healthy, and dry. The scalability of our distribution model helps us reach more families and service more partners when we have more resources available to increase our capacity.

We have a track record of growth and success, and our organization continues to serve as a model nationwide. We've proven we can effectively scale up when given the support to do so. When we received additional funding at the onset of the pandemic, we were able to immediately expand, take on new partners, and reach more families and individuals. Our annual budget in 2019 was less than \$700,000, and today, it's \$2.8 million, and we have over 160 distribution partners across the state.

Although the COVID emergency funds we received are ending in December 2023, we know scaling back is not an option. Instead, we will continue to move forward with the benchmarks we've reached and pursue our strategic plan for sustainability and transformational change.

Your support is an investment in not only the lives of families across our state but also critical developments that will have even deeper, long-term impacts, that will reach farther than we have before.

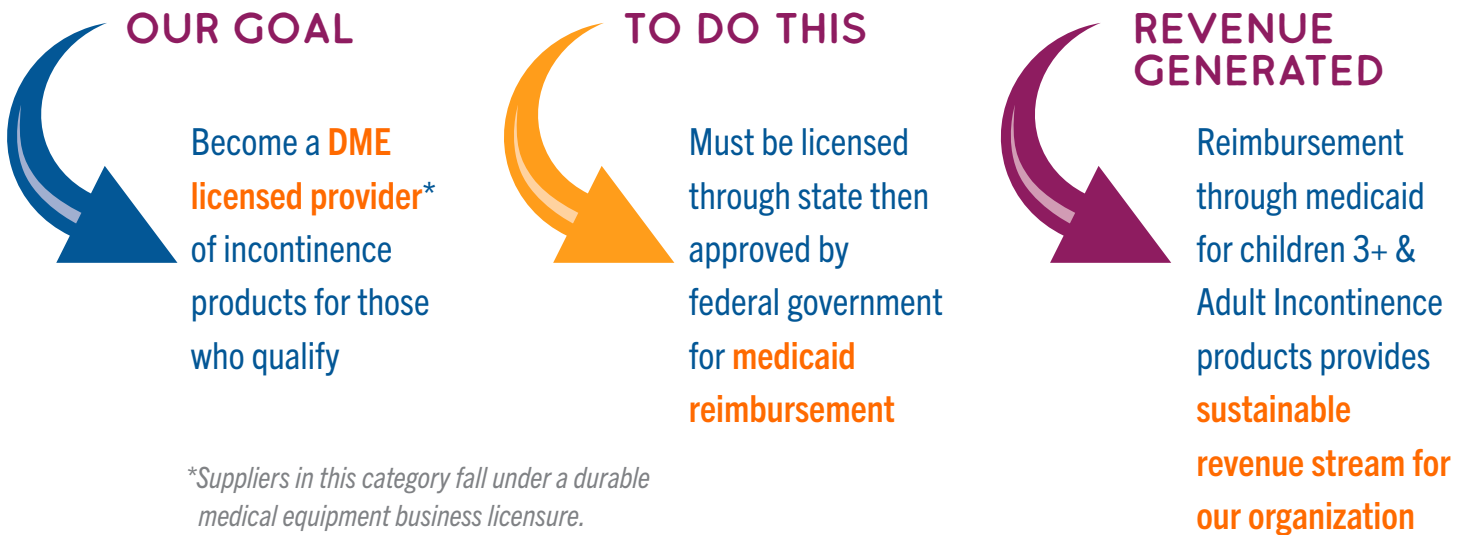

DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT CHART

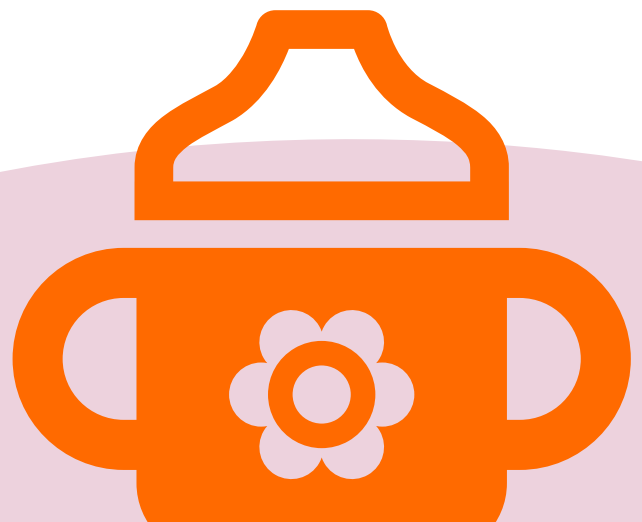


Medicaid Reimbursement

A top priority this year is to create a sustainable revenue stream by building out a Medicaid Reimbursement model for incontinence products by becoming a licensed provider of Durable Medical Equipment (DME). This will be the first of its kind and serve as a nationwide model. Developing this will help to alleviate our reliance on other fluctuating funding sources and align us with the goal of becoming a more self-sustaining organization. The revenue generated from billing Medicaid for youth and adult incontinence products can provide a sustainable revenue stream that can be put back into our organization. This is part of our continuous overall strategy to diversify our revenue while we increase our distribution to meet more of the need that exists in our state. In addition to the positive financial impacts, it will elevate our mission, serve more people in our state, grow our organization, and ensure our longevity.

Regional Expansion

In partnership with the Massachusetts Association for Community Action (MASSCAP), our organization will be joining a regional effort to continue addressing diaper need and distribute diapers through a network of

community partners. This is a part of the first and only federal funding to support diaper distribution programs, the Diaper Distribution Demonstration and Research Pilot (DDDRP).

Growing Diaper Connections in Partnership with The Connecticut Hospital Association

In November of 2022, the Connecticut Hospital Association (CHA), Connecticut’s hospitals, and The Diaper Bank of Connecticut (DBCT) officially launched their partnership to address diaper insecurity and diaper need, called Diaper Connections. Through Diaper Connections, we have collaboratively found a new way to reach more families and enhance the health status of infants and toddlers and their parents. We are continuing to implement distribution models, such as distributing diapers in labor and delivery units— identifying diaper needs at birth. Thus far, we know we have reached at least 2,200 families through Diaper Connections across the state, and we have grown our distribution network by 33 new partners.

Continued Advocacy for Medicaid Coverage for Diapers

This past Spring, we began advocating for Medicaid coverage for infant and toddler diapers. State legislative champion, Representative Jillian Gilchrest presented a bill, we held a successful lobbying day at the Connecticut State Capitol, and received a great amount of testimony in support of the legislation. The bill passed the House and although it didn’t pass this legislative session, we are working alongside our partners at The Connecticut Hospital Association and Representative Gilchrest, who has established a Health-Related Social Needs Working

Group, to study the coverage of services that address health-related social needs, including diapers, through Medicaid. This is a huge milestone in reaching our ultimate goal, and our advocacy and research will continue throughout the year.

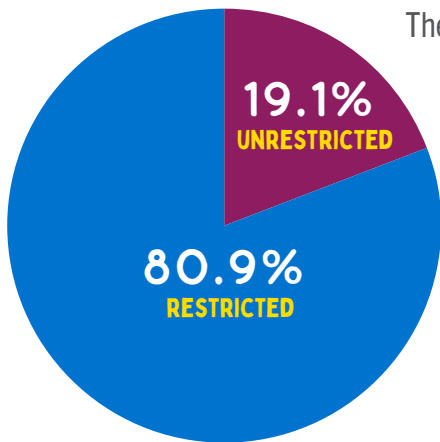

UNRESTRICTED FUNDS VS. RESTRICTED FUNDS

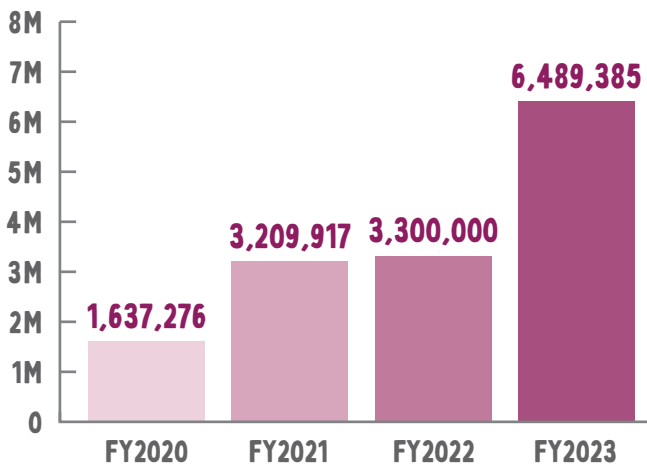


The DBCT currently holds three governmental contracts, one of which is a line item in the State budget. The additional contracts are Covid-related emergency funds that are nonrenewable. Collectively these three sources are restricted funds that make up approximately 80% of the budget.

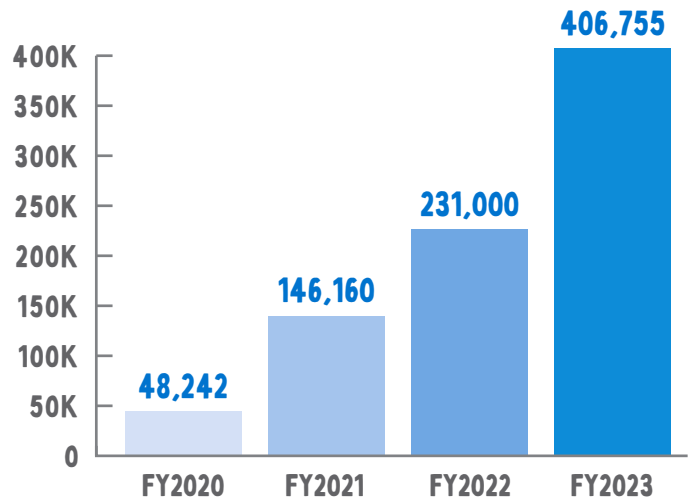

PRODUCTS DISTRIBUTION GROWTH

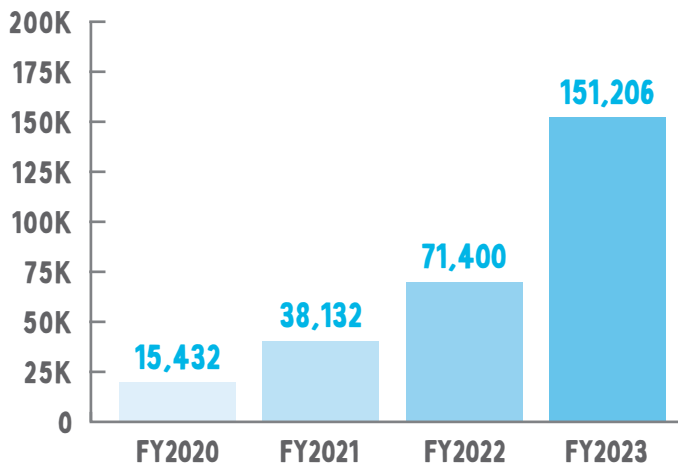

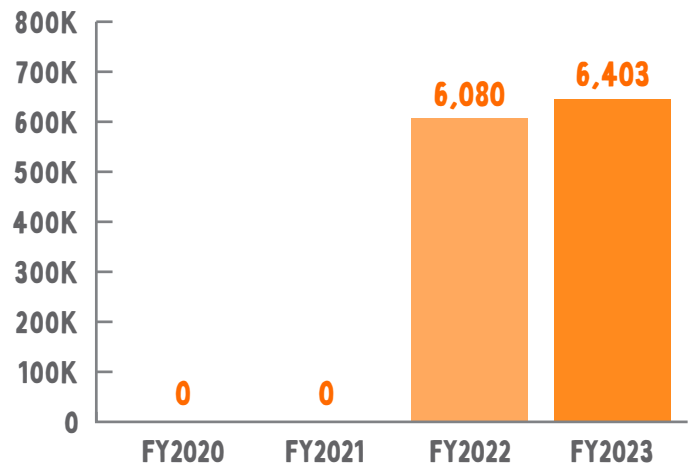
PERIOD SUPPLIES

YOUTH INCONTINENCE PRODUCTS



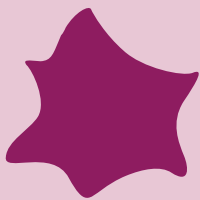

YOUTH ADVOCATE SPOTLIGHT

A Q&A WITH YOUTH ADVOCATE, OLIVE GOLDENBERG

Olive Goldenberg is a 12-year-old youth advocate in Connecticut raised in a home surrounded by advocacy. Olive hosted a period product drive for The Diaper Bank of Connecticut last year, and continues to be an advocate for menstrual equity within her community. We spoke with her about the work she does, what inspires her, how other advocates can be involved in the movement toward menstrual equity, and tips to host their own product drive.



Tell us how advocacy for menstrual equity has become such an important part of your life.

My mum is very passionate about the fight for change and I've definitely inherited her fight. Menstrual equity was something I kind of fell into, being young and not actually having had a period, I wasn't aware period poverty was an issue. But I listened to a LiveGirl podcast with my mum last year and was so upset by the inequities menstruators face. I have been incredibly fortunate to be in a very open and communicative family, something not everyone benefits from. I realized educating ALL people about menstruation is as important as making sure all menstruators have access to menstrual hygiene.

What does menstrual equity mean to you?

Menstrual equity means that everyone should have access to menstrual products and the right to education; which would in turn reduce the stigma surrounding menstruation.

What inspired you to host a period product drive for The Diaper Bank of Connecticut?

I wanted to get involved in the fight for menstrual equity and I realized one very easy way was to hold a product drive. Anyone can do it, you just need to get the word out!

We loved seeing how much fun you had doing the work for your drive. Were a lot of people eager to participate?

The whole experience was so fun! I've never hosted a drive before. I used the local library as a drop-off point and had a whole host of information for people to read and a link to my Instagram page ([@olive_gives](#)) to enable everyone to follow the journey. I made flyers that I distributed in local business windows. I also set up an Amazon wish list, which enabled my UK friends and family to donate as well as people who couldn't make it to the library. I can't wait to host my next drive, I hope it gets even more traction.



Did you have to educate a lot of people on the issue? If so, what was that like?

I did have to educate quite a few people on the matter of menstrual poverty, but I was happy to explain and everyone was eager to learn! That encouraged me to then host a screening of the film “Period. End of Sentence” along with an educational talk and Q&A with Jenny Kohl (of DBCT).

One thing that really stood out to me was how many people commented on the high price of menstrual products and said that when they were looking to choose products, they realized that the prices of products cause an immediate inequity – some people can only afford the non-branded, cheaper products, not enabling them actual choice! They don’t get to choose for comfort or absorption, they just have to grab the cheapest option.

What advice would you give to someone interested in hosting a period product drive (for DBCT)?

I would say just DO IT!! It’s so fun. Any amount of donations makes a difference and shows that you care, and you might encourage conversation around a taboo topic in our community which is a great thing. Choose a location for dropping off that’s easy to get to, like a school, library, or local business. If you want to reach a wider community, make an Amazon wishlist that delivers to your door. And just have fun! I loved having my Instagram page to allow everyone to come on the journey and for everyone who donated to know how appreciated they were. Without donors, I wouldn’t have had a successful or fun drive! If you follow those tips, your drive should hopefully be stress-free.

What's next for you in the fight for menstrual equity?

I was invited as part of LiveGirl to share my journey at Connecticut's first-ever Menstrual Equity Summit hosted by DBCTJ - where I learned about other amazing youth advocacy programs in surrounding communities. I have recently been accepted into The Pad Project's

Ambassador program, which I am so excited about. I am also hoping to approach a few local places about hosting more screenings of the movie 'Period. End of Sentence' which will also include an educational conversation.

“ I really think the more those who menstruate and those who don't menstruate know about the body and periods, the more we move toward ending the stigma around periods.

What advice would you give to other youth advocates looking to get involved in period equity work?

I definitely suggest hosting a drive. Not only does it get others involved, but you'll learn a lot about the subject, too! You don't have to do it alone, ask a friend or family member to help! You could reach out to non-profits, the library, and even your school to find out what opportunities they offer or how you can help. You might be able to volunteer, there may be youth groups you can join, or you could start your own group at school and get peers engaged. Definitely read, watch, and research. [tdh](#)

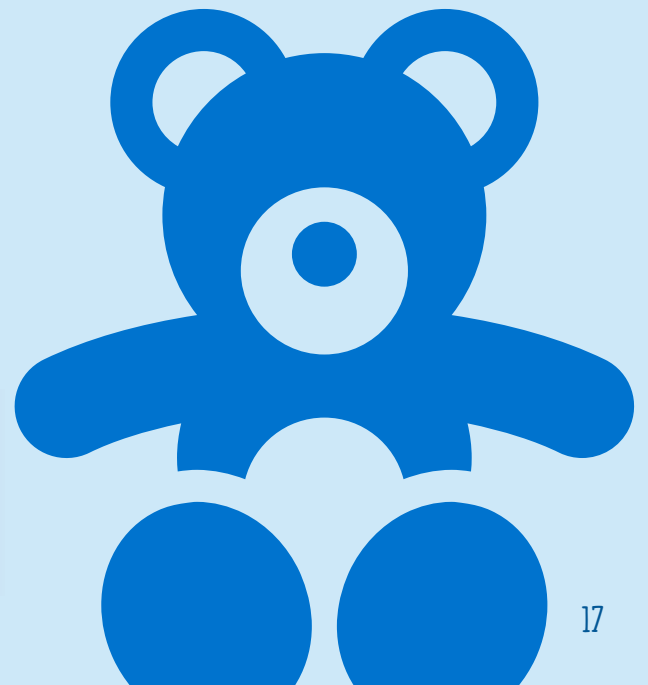
